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Commentary

Driving Prices Up

- Cotton harvest is off to a slow start with wet conditions prevailing across much of the growing area. Big volumes are yet to hit the market.
- Wheat prices have started to climb sharply, with futures pricing having increased almost 8.5 per cent over the month.
- Soy prices remain volatile with fund managers adjusting their position and the Australian dollar being volatile among interest rate speculation. This tends to flow onto other vegetable proteins.

Driving Prices Down

- Wet conditions in northern New South Wales (NSW) have led to a lot less supplementary feeding required. With a wet forecast, this looks set to carry through well into winter.
- Hay supply remains plentiful in southern Australia and the autumn break has arrived in large parts of western Victoria and Gippsland. Fodder type replacement products, such as almond hulls are being used less as more pasture hits diets.
- Food services are running close to capacity with some of the short shelf-life products being available in high volumes and needing to be placed.

Local News

- Saputo Dairy Australia have indicated an opening price of \$7.80 \$8.00 per kg MS. Farmers are approaching the next season extremely cautiously regarding excess stock and fodder on hand.
- Dairy cattle cull prices remain soft with some abattoirs having three-week wait times in Victoria. Tasmania which is heavily affected by dry weather is reporting waiting times for cull cattle of more than 12 weeks. This is leading to pressure in the Victorian market with some cattle coming into Victoria.
