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Commentary

Driving Prices Up

— There isn't too much upward pressure on commodities now. The Russia – Ukraine war continues to underpin cereal grain pricing somewhat – and has a knock-on effect into energy-based by-products.

Driving Prices Down

- Q4 soya bean meal is indicated at \$775 ex Brisbane, Sydney, and Melbourne. This is keeping a lid on canola meal, with uncontracted and late contracts being a significant discount on the last 6 8 weeks.
- Almond harvest has started, with 2024 almond hulls now being fed on farm. There is a significant reduction on the initial asking price from the traders, with cereal hay being the replacement product most people have used instead.
- Northern Victoria and southern Riverina irrigation remains compelling/attractive, with water at historically low prices. Some farms have already started their autumn watering campaign, and this is reducing the need for purchased product, as well as contract growers having good stock levels to take advantage of.

Local News

- Global Dairy Trade (GDT) has ended its seven-session run of positives, with a 2.3% decline on the latest result. Confidence in another good price season on-farm remains high and farms are setting up for a good 2024/25 season with few only half committed as seen in previous years.
- Beef cattle prices have firmed dramatically, and more animals are now on feed in feedlots across southern Australia. Beef on Dairy growth has been substantial with a heavy focus on concentrate feeding rather than a more traditional total mixed ration (TMR).
- The Co-product market from Sydney is now looking for more off-take south of Sydney, with favourable conditions to the North leading to a dampening of demand. As usual, freight remains a big restriction.
