## Commentary

#### **Driving Prices Up**

- With cereal grain harvest now complete, a price range has established and steadied somewhat. Starch and sugar-based products are basically static.
- Increased freight rates remain an issue for products that are either lower dry matter or low bulk density. This is the case for both citrus pulp and almond hulls on long hauls moving east from Mildura into the dairying regions. This won't ease.
- Indications on new seasons almond hulls are starting to emerge, with prices in excess of \$220 per tonne quoted in the NSW Riverina. This is likely to lead to a stalemate for the time being.
- Canola seed crush capacity is well down with a large crushing plant being out of action. This isn't likely to ease until well into March.

### **Driving Prices Down**

- Cottonseed stocks are now being cleared prior to the new season's harvest.
- An abundance of purchased forage options and unexpected and unseasonal pasture growth is lowering demand on forage replacement type products, such as almond hulls.

#### **Local News**

- The beef market is recovering very strongly, lower feed prices and the dry conditions that didn't materialise has led to an upsurge in market confidence, with growers now comfortable they can finish cattle with feed on hand or going into the feed market.
- Cargill is upgrading its canola crushing plant at Footscray, leading to capacity issues in the region. Canola meal contracts are being drawn on very carefully and supply issues have been seen on some farms.
